Report from the Trustee Board

I am happy to say that 2025-26 has once again been a successful year for Scouting in Worcester, with a variety of engaging activities for our young people and leaders to get involved in.

In our work this year, the trustee board has been sure to align with the aims and objectives of the District Operational Team. In particular, we have been continuing to build up our equipment stockpile to increase the variety of activities we can provide. This has included improving our inventory systems to simplify groups' access to this equipment. Alongside this, we have reviewed our support funding process to try and reduce the barrier of cost to any members of the movement hoping to engage with any activities.

The trustee board has put a lot of work in continuing and improving on our oversight of all district activities over the last 12 months. This has included reviewing a number of our policies, as well as drafting some to cover areas we previously did not. We are also conducting a full review of our risk register to ensure it comprehensively reflects all district operations. We have also reviewed some of our financial control measures to ensure we have a thorough understanding of the financial status of all activities whilst maintaining a balance between the treasurer's governance and operational responsibilities.

Moving forward, the district trustee board is exploring the different ways that we can support group trustee boards and support governance across the District. So far this has included opening more direct lines of communication and attending meetings to support their trustees directly. This is further supported by signposting resources from TSA and the recruitment efforts of our Volunteer Development team. We are continuing to review what support we are able to offer, including potential networking opportunities to promote mutual support.

I would like to thank all members of the trustee board for their continued support of scouting across the city.

We extend our sincere appreciation for their commitment to these roles. We also mourn the loss of Chris Margettes (10th W), a respected member of GL, who passed away following a short illness. Our heartfelt condolences are extended to his family and fellow volunteers.

Recognition of Service

We continue to recognise years of service within the district with sixteen five-year service, nine ten-year service, five fifteen-year service, two twenty-year service, five twenty-five-year service and finally one forty-year service. We have also had several commendation awards during the year.

Membership Overview

Although there has been a reduction of 2.5% in young member numbers there has been an impressive 20.6% growth in adult volunteers, aligning with the district adult recruitment plan. These encouraging results underscore effective recruitment and a welcoming district culture. The influx of new adult volunteers has invigorated the group with enthusiasm and fresh perspectives, boosting support for youth members and expanding the range of activities and opportunities offered by the district.

These events reflect the diversity and spirit of Scouting in Worcester, where young people continue to build skills for life in safe, inclusive, and adventurous settings.

It has been a fantastic year of fun, learning, and growth across Scouts Worcester. Every event – from small section meetings to large-scale activities – has contributed to building confidence, resilience, and friendships among our young people.

We would like to extend a sincere thank you to all volunteers, leaders, helpers, parents, and supporters who made these events possible. Your time, passion, and commitment are what keep Scouting in Worcester thriving.

Report from the Network Team

Black Pear Network have had an adventurous year, with two international Explorer Belt expeditions, a week in Edinburgh, King's Scout Award expeditions via paddleboard (supported by 5th Worcester), and several members on County's Costa Rica trip and World Scout Moot. They started regular chilled social activities on Sunday evenings, and continued a wide variety of other activities and smaller camps, from podcasting to Dungeons and Dragons to canoe adventures. Between them, they achieved 6 King's Scout Awards, 3 Duke of Edinburgh Gold Awards, and 4 Explorer Belt Awards.

Looking ahead to 2026, they're planning a week in Norfolk in the Summer, King's Scout Award expeditions in the Autumn, and already thinking about an Interrail adventure for 2027. In the meantime, there's plenty of everyday Scouting happening with a Network twist, including mixology, trips to IKEA, book club, day walks, venue maintenance, and terrarium making. They're also looking to build closer links with Explorers over the next year, as well as completing their 26 in 26 awards for working through an alphabet of activities this year.

Constitution and Charitable Aims

The full name of the charity is 'Worcester District Scout Council' and the charity registration number is 524644. The charity is an educational charity established in accordance with the Policy, Organisation and Rules (POR) of The Scout Association. The District Scout Council has adopted the standard constitution recommended in chapter 5 of POR and adopted the necessary associated resolutions, e.g. quorum for meetings.

Scouting exists to actively engage and support young people in their personal development, empowering them to make a positive contribution to society.

As defined in POR, Scouting takes place when young people, in partnership with adults, work together based on the values of Scouting and:

- Enjoy what they are doing and have fun
- Take part in activities indoors and outdoors
- Learn by doing
- Share in spiritual reflection
- Take responsibility and make choices
- Undertake new and challenging activities
- Make and live by their Promise.

This Trustee Board exists to make sure the charity is well-managed, risks are assessed and mitigated, buildings and equipment are in good working order, and everyone follows legal requirements and the organisation's policies and rules. Their support helps other volunteers run high quality and safe programmes that give young people skills for life.

Financial Report

For the Financial Year Ended 31st March 2026

Introduction

This report provides an overview of the financial activities and position of the Worcester District Scouts for the financial year 2025/2026, covering the period from 1st April 2025 to 31st March 2026. The aim is to present a clear and concise summary of our financial health, highlighting key income and expenditure streams, and our overall financial stability.

Key Highlights

The Worcester District Scouts has maintained a sound financial position throughout the 2025/2026 financial year, allowing us to continue supporting our groups and providing high-quality Scouting experiences. We saw a flatline in our membership subscriptions, though a decrease in income due to an alternative payment plan arranged with one group due to extenuating circumstances. We have a deficit with international trips due to income being received in the previous financial accounting period. To spread the cost for young people most deposits and payment plans had started before the trips that happen in this financial year, Denmark and Belgium respectively. This deficit was planned into our cashflow and noted in the previous years accounts.

Income Summary

Our income for the year was primarily derived from the following sources:

- **Membership Subscriptions:** The primary source of income, reflecting the strength of our membership across the District.
- **Grants and Donations:** We were fortunate to receive a grant from Worcestershire County Council.
- **Badge Sales:** Income taken from the sale of Scout badges, primarily to local groups. This income primarily goes towards our support fund.

Expenditure Summary

Expenditure for the year was carefully managed to ensure maximum benefit for our young people. Covering essential operational costs and maintaining our cost neutral approach to District-level activities:

- **District Activities & Events:** Costs associated with District camp as well as district events for Squirrels, Beavers, Cubs, Scouts and Explorers.
- **Equipment & Resources:** Purchase and maintenance of District equipment.
- **Container ground rent:** For storing the district equipment safely and securely
- **Administration & Insurance:** Essential costs for District administration.

Financial Position

As detailed in the accounts, our financial position remains robust, with healthy reserves providing stability and security for future operations. We are able to fulfil our reserve policy which is fixed at 15k minimum for the year
